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STATE WATER CONSERVATION COMMISSION Minutes of Meeting Held in Water Conservation Commission Office Bismarck, North Dakota, June 29, 1951

On June 29, 1951, at 9:30 o'clock a.m., the Members of the State Water Conservation Commission convened for a regular meeting in the Office of the Water Conservation Commission. The following persons were in attendance:

The meeting was called to order by Governor Brunsdale at 9:30 o'clock a.m. with the above mentioned Commissioners present.

A motion was made by Commissioner E. Dahl, and seconded by Commissioner Christensen, that the minutes of the State Water Conservation Commission meeting held on May 28, 1951, be approved and filed for record. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Commissioner Olson, and seconded by Commissioner M. Dahl, that the financial statements of the State Water Commission for the month of May, 1951, be approved and filed for record in the office of the Water Commission. Motion carried.

Leroy Pease, Executive Secretary of the Greater North Dakota Association entered the meeting at 9:40 a.m. Mr. Pease appeared before the Commission to find out if the Commission wished to continue purchasing films of the North Dakota water development program, to be kept in the office of the Commission as a historical record. He stated that Commissioner Simons had suggested years ago that the Greater North Dakota Association furnish a picture of the water development program in North Dakota and said they would like to go ahead with the arrangement if the Commission approved of it. Commissioner Christensen made a motion that "a maximum of \$1250 be set aside for the payment of filming and recording of the North Dakota water development program for the fiscal year, 1951-1953". The motion was seconded by Commissioner E. Dahl. Upon call of the roll by the Chairman, Commissioners Math Dahl, Einar Dahl, Christensen, Lunseth, Olson and Gov. Brunsdale all voted in favor of the motion. Motion carried.

Commissioner Curtis Olson reported on Ashtabula Reservoir in Griggs County concerning the relocation of roads and bridges. He explained that during the construction period of the Baldhill Dam, money had been deposited in the Bank of North Dakota by the Eastern North Dakota Water Development Association to repay Griggs County for costs in relocating of roads and one bridge, when the agreement was made to go ahead with the work on the dam. These funds have been on deposit in the

Bank of North Dakota to the credit of Griggs County for approximately three years, but they have refused to cooperate in securing the easements and rebuilding the roadways, and Sverdrup Township continues to refuse to grant the necessary easement or build roadways. A letter from the Corps of Engineers, St. Paul, was read, which requested the Water Commission to take action to furnish the Office of the Corps of Engineers with flowage easements over roads and bridges within the reservoir area in Sverdrup Township, as they will not complete the reservoir until they have all the easements, and also a letter from Ralph Croal, Attorney at Fargo, which expressed the willingness of the Eastern North Dakota Water Development Association to assist in securing these easements. The Commissioners were of the opinion they could take no action on this matter at the present time, and requested Commissioner Olson to work with the Eastern North Dakota Water Development Association and Griggs County in solving the problem.

Commissioners Olson and Lunseth reported on the Public Hearings held by the Corps of Engineers for review investigations of flood control on the Red River.

Commissioner Olson reported that at the hearings attended by him, the local people were concerned chiefly with their own individual drainage problems, while the main purpose of these meetings called by Col. Yoder was to secure data on local flood conditions along the Red River and its tributaries, the report to be transmitted to Washington.

Commissioner Lunseth reported on the meeting at Grafton, conducted by Col. Yoder, stating that flood reports along the Park River were incomplete and that a true estimate of damages caused by flood to the City of Grafton and surrounding country could not be determined.

Commissioner Lunseth said that only a partial report could be given from the City of Grand Forks as business houses and railroads were poorly represented. Armours Company and the State Mill and Elevator reported some of their losses. The Morthern Pacific Railroad reported \$290,000 of damages, the Northern States Power Company from \$15,000 to \$20,000, Minnkota Power Cooperative reported \$50,000 and East Grand Forks was fifty per cent flooded. Representatives from both Minnesota and North Dakota from the Red River basin were present, also representatives from the City of Winnipeg, Manitoba, farmers from the Clearwater area—one farmer reporting no crop at all, and Bowesmont, where sixty per cent of the country was flooded for twenty-five to forty days. Mr. Lunseth said the highways had aggravated the situation in the Grafton area, most of the water coming in from the country-side.

Secretary Walsh stated that several thousand dollars of flood losses were reported at the Lakota meeting, while Fargo failed to report any losses, and Moorhead was not represented. Damages of over one million dollars were reported at the Devils Lake meeting.

Secretary Walsh informed the Members of the Commission that the North Dakota Agricultural College has submitted their report of Soil Investigations and Soil Survey work conducted by the Agricultural Experiment Station in cooperation with the Water Commission and the Bureau of Reclamation.

Governor Brunsdale reviewed the chief items of interest on the agenda at the Missouri Basin Inter-Agency meeting held at Shenandoah, Iowa, in June. He stated their chief problem was soil conservation in the watershed area where lands were being damaged by tributary streams, causing much soil erosion. Only about sixty per cent of the land around Shenandoah is under crop and the steep sloping land is being farmed on the contour system. Terraces have also been built on the steep inclines of the valleys to help conserve soil. The Governor also stated that a complete survey of hydroelectric power is being conducted in the Missouri River area

in an attempt to find out the present power potential developed by private and public industries and future requirements needed in the valley. The Governor also reported on the progress of construction of Hawaii Dam, Gavins Point and Fort Randall dam, saying they expected to close the dam at Fort Randall next year.

Commissioner Lunseth gave a report on the Governors' Conference at Omaha, Mebraska, June 17. Six Governors were present: Governor Williams from Michigan, Kohler from Wisconsin, Anderson from South Dakota, Peterson from Nebraska, Arn from Kansas and Smith from Missouri; and representatives from Minnesota, Illinois, Iowa, North Dakota, Ohio and Montana. Other speakers present were: Oscar L. Chapman, Secretary of the Interior, General Pick and representatives of the C.I.O. and the Grange. Discussion pertained mostly to the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence water and power development, the speakers all being in favor of it. On a tour of the Oliver Mining Company it was reported that the iron ore of the Mesabi Range in Minnesota would be depleted in about sixteen years. Plans are now being made to transport iron ore from Labrador, which explains the need for the St. Lawrence seaway, otherwise the steel industry will be compelled to move to the Atlantic seaboard. Mr. Lunseth explained that the chief purpose of the meeting was to obtain the support of the midwestern states in the development of the St. awrence seaway. Consideration was given at this time to continuing the Governors! Conference of the midwestern states and Governors Williams from Michigan and Peterson from Nebraska were delegated to contact the governors of the various states.

Continuation of cooperative investigations and surveys with the Geological Survey were discussed, the Commission taking the following action: Commissioner Einar Dahl made a motion that the Secretary be authorized to sign the cooperative agreement with the U.S. Geological Survey for continuing the surface water investigations program in North Dakota during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1951, to June 30, 1952, each party to contribute an equal amount of \$12,500 toward these investigations. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Christensen. Upon roll call by the Chairman, Commissioners Olson, Lunseth, M. Dahl, Christensen, E. Dahl, and Gov. Brunsdale all voted in favor of the motion. Motion carried.

Commissioner Math Dahl made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Olson, that the Secretary be authorized to sign the cooperative agreement with the U.S. Geological Survey for continuing the topographic surveys in North Dakota during the biemnim beginning July 1, 1951, to June 30, 1953, each party to contribute an equal amount of \$35,000 toward these surveys. Upon roll call by the Chairman, Commissioners Einar Dahl, Math Dahl, Christensen, Lunseth, Olson and Gov. Brunsdale all voted in favor of the motion. Motion carried.

The dam repair program of the Commission was discussed and the Secretary informed the Commissioners that two bids were submitted for purchase of a tractor and loader, the Dakota Tractor Company quoting a price of approximately \$2,700 with a trade-in allowance of \$775 on the old loader, which was considered the better bid.

Commissioner Clson read a letter received from Eugene A. Burdick, Attorney for Mr. Paul Motzko. Mr. Burdick reported that Mr. Motzko is suffering considerable economic loss by reason of lack of water for irrigating, and requested further assurance from the Bureau of Reclamation as to their intentions with regard to assuming liability for damages resulting from negligence of the District. He also requested assistance from the State Engineer in the matter. Secretary Walsh explained that the modification of the control structure was the principal issue of controversy, and that the weir of the structure should be raised one foot. The Commissioners felt the only thing they could do for the present was to contact the Bureau of Reclamation on the matter. Commissioner Olson made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Lanseth, that Secretary Walsh be authorized to contact Kenneth F. Vernon,

Regional Director of the Bureau of Reclamation at Billings, and arrange for a meeting with representatives from the Water Commission, the District and Mr. Motzko in order to reach some mutual agreement. Upon roll call, all Commissioners voted unanimously in favor of the motion, motion carried.

The report of the State Examiner, covering the period April 1, 1950, to April 30, 1951, was presented to the Commission for their approval. Commissioner Olsen moved that the report of the examination of the Office of the State Water Conservation Commission by the State Examiner covering the period April 1, 1950, to April 30, 1951, be approved and placed on file in the office of the Water Commission. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Einar Dahl. Upon roll call, the Commissioners voted unanimously in favor of the motion. Motion carried.

The Commissioners were advised of the reappointment of Curtis Olson as a member of the State Water Conservation Commission for a term of six years, to run from July 1, 1951, to July 1, 1957.

Having complied with the rules and regulations of the Water Commission and hearings having been published and held according to law, with no objections presented, the Commission approved the following water-right applications:

A motion was made by Commissioner Math Dahl, and seconded by Commissioner Christensen, that the application of Adolph Kalina, Bowman, North Dakota, for permit to divert and appropriate water from Dry Run and Spring Creek, tributaries of Spring Creek and the Grand River, for the irrigation of 80.0 acres of land be granted, not to exceed an annual diversion of 80 acre feet of water and subject to all prior and existing water-rights and appropriations covering Dry Run and Spring Creek. Upon a unanimous vote of the Commissioners the motion carried.

A motion was made by Commissioner Christensen, and seconded by Commissioner Einar Dahl, that the application of J. H. Winslow, LaMoure, North Dakota, for permit to divert and appropriate water from the James River, tributary of the Missouri River, for the irrigation of 79.0 acres of land be granted, not to exceed an annual diversion of 79.0 acre feet of water and subject to all prior and existing water-rights and appropriations covering the James River. Upon a unanimous vote of the Commissioners the motion carried.

A motion was made by Commissioner Lunseth, and seconded by Commissioner Christensen, that the application of the James River Soil Conservation District, by Alfred Ulmer, its Chairman, Cakes, North Dakota, for permit to divert and appropriate underground water from wells located in Sections 32 and 33, Township 131 North, Range 59 West, Dickey County, for the irrigation of 121.2 acres of land be granted, not to exceed an annual diversion of 121.2 acre feet of water and subject to any existing groundwater rights that have been granted in the Cakes area. Upon a unanimous vote of the Commissioners the motion carried.

A motion was made by Commissioner Olson, and seconded by Commissioner Lunseth, that the application of Christ Christensen, Pekin, North Dakota, for permit to divert and appropriate water from the Sheyenne River, tributary of the Red River, for the irrigation of 72.4 acres of land be granted, not to exceed an annual diversion of 72.4 acre feet of water, subject to all prior and existing water-rights and appropriations covering the Sheyenne River, and subject to any compact or agreement regulating the division of waters of that stream. Upon a unanimous vote of the Commissioners the motion carried.

The meeting recessed at 12 o'clock noon to reconvene at 1:30 p.m. with Commissioners Christensen, M. Dahl, E. Dahl, Clson, Lunseth, J. J. Walsh and Vernon Cooper, Assistant Secretary, present.

Requests for drainage funds from the counties, which were all contacted before the day of the meeting, were considered by the Commissioners and the following funds were allocated from the balance of \$86,859.38 in the 1949-1951 drainage fund as of this date. These allocations were based on contracts actually let before July 1, 1951:

Governor Brumsdale entered the meeting at 2 o'clock p.m.

Commissioner Math Dahl made a motion that the requests for drainage funds by the various counties and allocated by the Water Commission from the balance remaining in the 1949-51 drainage fund be approved as corrected. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Christensen. Upon roll call by the Chairman, Governor Brunsdale and Commissioners Math Dahl, Einar Dahl, Olson, Christensen and Lunseth all voted aye. Motion carried.

A letter from Ken McIntyre of Prosper and L. F. Chaffee of Amenia was read with reference to the feasibility of utilizing the Rush River Water Conservation and Flood Control District for the construction of a lateral drain from north of Amenia into Drain No. 12 which empties into the Sheyenne River. Drains Nos. 2 and 12 are now substituting for the Rush River and very few sections of land are carrying the tax burden for the drains. The over-burdened drains can not take care of the spring runoff in addition to water diverted by the new lateral, therefore they wished to know if it would be feasible to dissolve Drains Nos. 2 and 12 and utilize the entire area of the Red River Conservation and Flood Control District as organized including the proposed lateral, and if under the circumstances it would be possible through such district to qualify for financial assistance form the State Water Conservation Commission and proceed with the work this summer.

Commissioner Olson made a motion that the State Water Commission assign Attorney I. A. Acker to investigate Drains Nos. 2 and 12 and the proposed lateral in Cass County to determine the legal status of prior easements on the land, before any decision is made by the Water Commission. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Lunseth. Upon a unanimius vote of the Commissioners the motion carried.

Payment of a voucher in the amount of \$1,200 to Fred J. Fredrickson for his services in representing the State Water Commission at Washington, D. C. for a six months period was deferred because of an opinion rendered previously by Attorney General E. T. Christianson with respect to Mr. Fredrickson's employment at Washington, D. C. The question arose as to whether the employment of Mr. Fredrickson to meet with committees in conference to promote the North Dakota water development program in Washington, D. C., could be termed as lobbying. As Attorney General Christianson had previously rendered an opinion to that effect, the Commission thought it advisable to ask the Attorney General to reconsider his former opinion

on the merits of the facts set forth in a report by Mr. Fredrickson of his work for the Commission. The Secretary was instructed to write the Attorney General a letter calling his attention to his former opinion and asking him to reconsider his decision in the light of this information, and to quote that portion of the minutes of the meeting which states Mr. Fredrickson's duties at the time of his employment.

The matter of refunding the Sioux Irrigation District bond issue was discussed by Commissioner Einar Dahl. He reviewed the action of the Commission on June 3, 1949, when a motion was passed authorizing negotiations to refund this issue with the interest rate to be reduced from 3 per cent to not less than 2 per cent. Commissioner Dahl informed the Commission that the Board of Directors of the Sioux Irrigation District have requested that this bond issue be refunded to extend over a forty year period with equal payments, including principal and interest, to be made over this period.

Commissioner Christensen made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Olson, that Commissioner Einar Dahl and Judge A. M. Christianson be authorized to work out a plan for refunding the Sioux Irrigation District bonds that will be acceptable to the District and to the Commission.

The meeting adjourned at 3a30 o'clock p.m.
