STATE WATER CONSERVATION COMMISSION Minutes of Meeting Held in Office of State Water Commission in Bismarck, North Dakota August 2, 1957

A regular meeting of the North Dakota State Water Conservation Commission was called to order on August 2, 1957, at the State Water Conservation Commission Office in Bismarck, North Dakota, to consider routine business matters. The following were present:

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 o'clock A.M. by Governor Davis with Commissioners Tucker, Corwin and Math Dahl, and Secretary Hoisveen present.

It was moved by Commissioner Tucker and seconded by Commissioner Corwin that the Minutes of the June 14th meeting be approved, and that the reading thereof be dispensed with. All members voted age and said motion carried.

It was moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by Commissioner Tucker that the Financial Statement for June, 1957, be approved and filed in the Office of the State Water Conservation Commission. All members voted age and said motion carried.

Secretary Hoisveen reported that he had received many favorable comments regarding the Resolution on the Garrison Diversion Unit Water appropriation which was forwarded to interested governmental agencies and congressional representatives. Replies were received from Mr. D. A. Williams, Administrator of the Soil Conservation Service, Washington, D.C.; Major Garrett of the Corps of Engineers, Washington, D. C.; Assistant Secretary Fred G. Aandahl of the Department of Interior and Senator Milton R. Young. A copy of said resolution was also incorporated in the July 17th copy of the Congressional Record by Senator Langer, a copy of which was forwarded Secretary Hoisveen.

Secretary Hoisveen reported that invitations have been forwarded to Senator Clinton P. Anderson and Representative Wayne N. Aspinall, Chairman of the Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation of the Senate and House of Representatives respectively, requesting them to hold Garrison Diversion Unit hearings in North Dakota. Governor Davis stated that he had been informed that they would consider coming to North Dakota if Congress adjourns without undue delay. He recommended that Secretary Hoisveen contact the various members of the committee set up among agencies and organizations concerned with the Garrison Diversion Project, informing them of the status of the invitations to the congressional committees and requesting that a selection of a tentative location for the committee hearings be made as soon as possible.

Secretary Hoisveen informed the Commission members that irrigation district hearings have been held at Oakes, Cogswell, Ypsilanti and LaMoure. The reception was very favorable at all meetings and the districts now include approximately 63,000 acres.

A letter written to Senator Allen Ellender, dated June 26, written at the request of Mayor Walter Burk of Williston, was read to Commission members. Said letter pertained to the Lewis and Clark Project and requested federal participation in extending the siphons and reconstruction of the laterals. Senator Young was successful in having language inserted into the appropriation bill authorizing expenditures on the Lewis and Clark Project not to exceed \$40,000, which amount will have to be repaid within a ten year period. It was recommended that further investigations be made of the Lewis and Clark District proposal in order to ascertain local sentiments regarding the project.

Secretary Hoisveen stated that the Commission had been petitioned by a group of farmers regarding culvert problems on Highway #5 in Bottineau County. An investigation was authorized to be made by Commission engineers concerning the problem. In some instances culvert installations appear inadequate. This matter will be considered by the State Highway Department and the Water Conservation Commission.

Commissioner Corwin reported on the meeting which was held at Jamestown on June 27th, which was attended by he and Secretary Hoisveen. The City of Jamestown and Stutsman County have joined together in requesting a county wide groundwater survey. This action is very commendable and will enable them to know exactly what their water potential is so far as inviting any industry into the county.

The groundwater drilling schedule was discussed with Commission members. Secretary Hoisveen stated that the survey at Ellendale is completed and that an adequate groundwater supply was located within a reasonable distance of Ellendale. The drilling rig is presently in use at Hatton, from there they will proceed to Hillsboro. Strasburg and Linton are next on the schedule.

Secretary Hoisveen stated that a Nebraska firm had advised him that they were unable to give a bid price on the test well at Cartwright as the test hole had not been penetrated deep enough originally. Secretary Hoisveen said that he contemplates interrupting the schedule of the drill rig long enough when they move to Strasburg to stop at Cartwright and drill another hole in an effort to get through a strata which appears to be filled with large cobble stones. He further stated that the original cost estimate of \$2000 was inadequate and requested the Commission members to approve an increase of \$1600, or a total amount of \$3600. It was moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by Commissioner Tucker that the total amount of \$3600 be authorized and that Secretary Hoisveen work out a salvage agreement with an interested farmer in the area in the event said well is not successful so far as Commission requirements are concerned. Upon roll call all members voted aye and said motion carried.

Commissioner Corwin stated that Commissioners A. M. Christensen and Oscar Lunseth and he, along with Chief Engineer Hoisveen, met with the Royal Flood Commission at Fargo on July 8th. The meeting consisted of a group of laymen who were interested in determining what effect water conservation and flood control projects in North Dakota might be having on Winnipeg flooding. The Soil Conservation Service reported on their watershed projects. The Bureau of Reclamation mentioned the return flows which they may eventually place in the Red River of the North and the Corps of Engineers outlined several of their projects which tend to curb flooding. The State Water Conservation Commission mentioned the drainage programs that might be adversely affecting Winnipeg flooding and the dams that were being constructed in the state that would aid in curtailing the flooding. It was generally conceded that the conservation benefits were greater than downstream damages caused from our drainage practices but these benefits are not sufficient to curtail severe flooding. It was further pointed out that

the State Water Conservation Commission had proposed a project whereby return flow water from the Bureau of Reclamation could be diverted into the Pembina River and impounded for release at dates which would not aggravate Winnipeg flooding. It was the general consensus of opinion of all present that no great curtailment in flooding could be expected from North Dakota as the terrain was such that large reservoirs impounding millions of acre feet could not be constructed.

Secretary Hoisveen reported that a meeting has been scheduled on August 6th in the Parliament Building, Winnipeg, Canada, with Canadian Water Resource officials. This meeting will deal primarily with the Lake Metigoshe stabilization project. The group at Lake Metigoshe organized the Cak Creek Water Conservation and Flood Control District, of which Mr. Glen Swanson is Chairman. Mr. Swanson stated that he would like to have some members of the Commission in attendance at the Winnipeg meeting. Governor Davis recommended that Commissioner Christensen be contacted and urged to attend said meeting, inasmuch as said area is in his district. Secretary Hoisveen also mentioned that he had made arrangements to discuss with interested Canadian officials problems affiliated with the Zahn International Drain, north of Westhope, North Dakota. Canadian farmers have apparently blocked the drain and it is causing flooding on the North Dakota side of the boundary.

Approval of the Scranton Flood Protective Project has been obtained, according to a telegram from Senator Young to Secretary Hoisveen on July 5th, and which was read to Commission members. A letter from Representative Otto Krueger, enclosing a letter from General Person, Assistant Chief of Engineers for Civil Works, was also read. General Person stated that funds were being allotted to the Omaha District Engineer for construction of the project, which is contingent upon receipt from local interests of assurances of local cooperation. All members were pleased as to the progress of the project.

An informative report on supplemental information to the October 1956 report on the Bowman-Haley Municipal and Industrial Water Study was made available to all Commission members. A copy of said report is on file in the office of the State Water Conservation Commission.

Secretary Hoisveen reported on the Board of Directors meeting of the National Reclamation Association which he attended at Denver on July 24, 25 and 26. He is National Director of said organization and also represented Mr. Mark Andrews on the Land Limitation Committee. He reported that the Land Limitation Committee considered the Barrett Bill which provides that the 160 acre limitation be modified under certain conditions, and in accordance with a request originating with the Governor of the affected State. In the bill the Secretary of Interior would have the authority to increase the acreage limitation if he determined it necessary. The Barrett Bill, if enacted into law, would be of considerable help in connection with irrigation development in North Dakota. One of the other bills that came up for consideration was S. 497, which is referred to as the Omnibus Bill. Certain language had been inserted in this bill giving new authority to the Corps of Engineers and Department of Interior in connection with the development of water resource projects which had been amended in the House to give this authority only to the Corps. As amended the bill appears to have an adverse effect on state water rights also. It now appears that further amendments to the bill will be needed and are desirable.

It was moved by Commissioner Tucker and seconded by Commissioner Corwin that Secretary Hoisveen be authorized to cooperate with Project Coordinator Fredrickson in writing letters and preparing resolutions for use by our congressional delegation and interested agencies concerned with the objectionable features included

in the Omnibus Bill, which gives undue authority to the Corps of Engineers in conjunction with the regulation of reservoir waters of the State, and the use of State waters without obtaining a water right.

The Reclamation Association plans to hold its convention in Phoenix, Arizona, the week of November 4th and Secretary Hoisveen urged that as many commission members as possible attend said meeting. Governor Davis recommended that all members be contacted and that three members, if possible, attend said convention. Secretary Hoisveen mentioned that the convention would be designated as the Theodore Reosevelt convention and suggested that in view of the fact that Theodore Roosevelt made his home in the Badlands area, this fact be exploited in the Commission's exhibit. He further suggested that appropriate pictures and films be obtained from the Greater North Dakota Association of the Badlands area to be shown at the convention. It was unanimously agreed that this would bring much favorable publicity to the State and that Secretary Hoisveen act accordingly.

Commissioner Tucker reported on the State Reclamation Association meeting which was held in the Provident Life Auditorium, Bismarck, on July 30th, and followed by a luncheon at which talks were given by Colonel L. W. Pine of the Corps of Engineers, Mr. Bruce Johnson, Mr. S. W. Thompson and Chief Engineer Hoisveen. Commissioner Tucker said that he had told the group in attendance that they should not look to the Army Engineers or the Bureau of Reclamation for the development of irrigation, and that the development thereof was dependent upon local people, and urged that everything possible be done to expedite the progress of irrigation.

It was moved by Commissioner Tucker and seconded by Commissioner Corwin that the Commission participate in the construction of the following dams and drains: (a) Shmisek Lake in Burke County. Estimated cost is \$15,000. Participation -Burke County 1/3, Game and Fish Department 1/3 and State Water Commission 1/3. (b) Metigoshe Causeway protection. Estimated cost is \$3162. Participation - Bureau of Public Roads 1/2, Bottineau County Commissioners 1/4, State Water Commission 1/4. (c) Bucephalia Dam in Foster County. Estimated cost is \$5100. Participation - Foster County 1/3, Game and Fish Department 1/3, State Water Commission 1/3. A request was received from Foster County asking the State Water Conservation Commission to make periodic inspections of dams within the limits of that county for repair work. It was agreed by the Commission members that the Commission staff make such inspections as provided by the Chief Engineer. (d) Kane-Tacoma drain in Bottineau County. The estimated construction cost of the drain approximates \$37,800 and the Commission has agreed to bear 40% of the above cost and the Bottineau County Drain Board 60%. (e) Ovregard Drain in Bottineau County. Participation - Bottineau County Drain Board 60% and the State Water Commission 40% of the eligible construction costs of said drain. (f) Hanson Dam in Barnes County. Estimated cost is \$500. Participation -Barnes County Board of Commissioners 1/2, State Water Commission 1/2. (g) A survey was authorized on Kilen Lake in Rolette County, Peschek Dam in McKenzie County and Crooked Lake in McLean County. (h) Oak-Willow Creek Snagging and Clearing Project. The estimated cost is \$7500. Participation - Oak Creek Water Conservation and Flood Control District and McHenry County Drain Board 60%, State Water Commission 40%. It was recommended that this figure be submitted to McHenry County and that their commitment be obtained. (i) Crystal-Cart Creek Dam in Pembina County. Estimated cost is \$25,500. Participation - City of Crystal 1/2, State Water Commission 1/2. (j) Neche Dam in Pembina County. Estimated cost is \$4,000. Participation - City of Neche 1/2, State Water Commission 1/2. (k) Welk Dam in Emmons County. Estimated cost is \$7500. Participation - Emmons County Board of Commissioners 1/3, Game and Fish Department

1/3, State Water Commission 1/3. Upon roll call, all members voted are and the above motion was unanimously carried. Governor Davis requested that a tabulation be prepared indicating the estimated cost and actual cost of said dam repair jobs and that the same be submitted to the Commission members at a later date.

Secretary Hoisveen reported that he attended a meeting with the Richland County Board of Commissioners and the Richland County Drainage Board on July 2nd to discuss the drainage problems of that county and the functions of a Water Conservation and Flood Control District. At the request of the Board of Commissioners, Secretary Hoisveen wrote the Corps of Engineers requesting a survey of the entire area. In a letter dated July 17th from Colonel Rohde, it was stated that no funds were available for a basin-wide review this fiscal year and requested maps showing the problem area, a brief description of the type of damage and other pertinent data so they could evaluate the same so far as a priority basis is concerned when funds are available. The Water Commission will continue to cooperate with the Corps in this matter.

It was reported by Secretary Hoisveen that a meeting will be held in Amenia, North Dakota, on August 8th relative to modifying the boundaries of the Rush River District to include additional lands located north and west of the present district. The area to be included approximates 97 square miles and will enlarge the district to 304 square miles.

A copy of a resolution adopted by the Garrison Diversion Conservancy District commending the State Water Conservation Commission for their action in the reservation of water from the Missouri River was made available to all Commissioners.

A letter from Congressman Krueger relative to the Little Missouri Compact authorizing legislation, dated July 24th, was read to the Commission members by Secretary Hoisveen. Representative Krueger stated that the Full Interior Committee passed said legislation and that it will be brought up for House action on August 5th. Indications are that said legislation authorizing compact negotiations will be approved. Secretary Hoisveen stated that North Dakota had a considerably larger number of water right filings than other states concerned and should be in a favorable position in the compact negotiations. The North Dakota filings are of an early priority date.

It was moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by Commissioner Tucker that Secretary Hoisveen be authorized to attend the Western Association of State Engineers conference to be held in Seattle, Washington, August 21st to 23rd. All members voted aye and said motion carried.

It was moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by Commissioner Tucker that Secretary Hoisveen be authorized to hire Mr. S. S. Westgate of Bismarck as a Consultant Engineer in conjunction with several water projects in the State. All members voted aye and said motion carried.

Commissioner Tucker moved that the action of the State Engineer on the following water rights be approved, which motion was seconded by Commissioner Corwin.

#654. Thos. W. Ryan, Grand Forks requests the right to divert 230 acre feet of water from Danners Coulee to irrigate 236.9 acres. Said request granted. Motion carried.

#718. Mr. Duane Long of Marmarth requests the right to divert 80 acre feet of water from the Little Missouri to irrigate 38.2 acres. It was recommended that he be granted the right to divert 47 acre feet to irrigate 38.2 acres. Motion carried.

#719. The City of Northwood requests the right to divert 30,000,000 gallons per annum from groundwater sources for municipal use. Said city was granted the right to divert 92 acre feet per annum, which is the equivalent of 30,000,000 gallons per annum. Motion carried.
