A motion was made by Commissioner Gallagher and seconded by Commissioner Corwin that Commissioner Math Dahl be elected temporary chairman in the absence of Governor Guy and Vice Chairman Oscar Lunseth. Carried

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF Consideration was given to the minutes of the DECEMBER 8, 1961 meeting of the State Water Conservation Commission held in Bismarck, December 8, 1961. Mr. Steinberger moved the adoption of the minutes, which motion was seconded by Commissioner Corwin and carried.

APPROVAL OF FINANCIAL STATEMENT FOR DECEMBER 1961

Secretary Hoisveen reviewed the financial statement, indicating that care would be required in watching the dam construction fund in view of the accelerated program which was conducted during

the past construction season. It was moved by Commissioner Corwin and seconded by Commissioner Steinberger that the December 1961 financial statement be approved. Carried

REACTIVATION REQUEST FOR KNIFE RIVER DIVERSION PROJECT

- A

A letter was read by the Secretary requesting the State Water Conservation Commission to reactivate their interest in the Knife River Diversion Project. The letter stated the Board

of County Commissioners of Mercer County had been approached by a delegation of landowners who indicated extreme interest in reviving the Knife River Diversion Project as well as expressing a desire to have a feasibility study made regarding the pumping of water from the Garrison Reservoir onto land northeast of the proposed diversion project. The proposal was reviewed and it was suggested that the Commission support the local landowners in requesting assistance from the Bureau of Reclamation to make such a feasibility study. Commissioner Gallagher expressed a desire that the possibility of creating impoundments and eventual irrigation through a gravity flow canal from the Garrison Reservoir should be included in such a study. Mr. Gallagher's proposal envisioned the impounding of water in the Missouri tributaries for release on Missouri River bottom land, as well as studying the possibility of conveying water into

the Knife and Heart River areas. Chief Engineer Hoisveen indicated that a very sketchy study had been made in this direction but additional work could be done in view of Mr. Gallagher's suggestion. A motion was made by Commissioner Gallagher and seconded by Commissioner Corwin that the Commission support the landowners in their request for the irrigation project in Mercer County. Carried.

CANNONBALL RIVER PETITION

A petition was read pertaining to the request of landowners living adjacent to the Cannonball River in Hettinger, Grant and Sioux Counties

who desire irrigation development along that stream. The petition requests the Commission and the Bureau of Reclamation, at an early date, to take all possible action to bring about the construction of necessary facilities along the stream in order to permit the full development of the water resources of this river for irrigation as well as other multiple purposes. The petitioners implied they were willing to assume responsibilities as to operation and costs for such development and stand ready to take the necessary steps to bring about irrigation development including the organization of an irrigation district and negotiating repayment contracts for irrigation facilities. Considerable discussion took place relative to the proposal in view of the fact that the Bureau of Reclamation, in cooperation with the State Water Conservation Commission, had, at one time, spent a considerable sum of money investigating this proposal and eventually it was rejected by the landowners. A motion was made by Commissioner Gallagher and seconded by Commissioner Corwin that the State Water Commissioner request the Bureau of Reclamation to make a complete review of the Cannonball project in order that this development could proceed if the landowners so desired. The motion was carried.

GARRISON RESERVOIR NAME CHANGE - ECONOMIC DEVELOP-MENT COMMISSION The Commission has been informed by letter from The Economic Development Commission Director that it was his opinion the naming of the Garrison Reservoir be placed in the hands of the

Tourist Promotion Bureau which is in the hands of the State Highway Department. The State Water Conservation Commission, in the December 8 meeting, had recommended that the Economic Development Commission poll various organizations, such as motel and hotel associations, regarding the selection of a suitable name for the Garrison Reservoir. The name "reservoir" was believed to have little or no tourist appeal and several requests had been received in the office to the State Water Commission requesting them to take action regarding the selection of a suitable name. (See page 12a)

MEMBERSHIP FEE - NORTH DAKOTA RESOURCES COUNCIL The matter of membership in the North Dakota Resources Council was called to the attention of the Commission. It has been proposed that a membership fee of \$40 be charged to the

members of the Council in order to defray certain expenses connected with the functions of this new organization. Eleven branches of the state government would be assessed for such memberships on an annual basis. It was the consensus of the commissioners that the Secretary should request Special Assistant Attorney General Iver Acker for his opinion regarding the matter.

PARSHALL GROUND WATER SURVEY

The Chief Engineer informed the group of the progress being made on the Parshall Ground Water Survey. He indicated that while a

considerable quantity of water has been located the quality is such that it

makes it unsuitable for municipal use. Mr. Hoisveen stated that correspondence had been carried on with the Ionic Corporation regarding charges for desalinization of the waters in that area. They informed the Commission that an overall rate between \$1.50 and \$1.75 per thousand gallons would probably result. They did make other technical information available to the Commission.

PARK RIVER SMAGGING AND CLEARING

The matter of snagging and clearing on the Park River below Homme Dam was brought to the attention of the Commission. It was pointed out that

the Commission allocated \$5,000 for such work approximately two years ago. The Commission had given the Corps of Engineers assurances at the time Homme Dam was constructed that the Park River Channel would be maintained. Since that date no maintenance has been carried on in the channel itself. Representations from the Commission had worked out an agreement with the Walsh County Board of County Commissioners whereby they would participate in this endeavor to the extent of 50% of the cost. The work is now underway but inclement weather and deep snow tend to hamper efficient operations and it was doubtful if the work could be completed during the current winter.

ELLENDALE DAM ABSTRACT OF BIDS The Commission was informed that bids were taken on the Ellendale Dam to be used in connection with the Ellendale water supply for

riprapping on the structure that was installed on that stream during the past summer construction season. The Commission was informed that the Dakota Construction Company was awarded a contract to do the work. They underbid the firm of Dockter and Johnson by \$32. The total amount of the work anticipated to be done under the contract is \$3,000.

CASS COUNTY DRAIN # 29

The drainage engineer for the State Water Conservation Commission stated that a request had

been received from the Cass County Drain Board for a survey plan and cost estimate of a drop structure on Cass County Drain near its confluence with the Red River. The State Water Commission authorized \$800 for survey and design of the drop structure of this drain. From this information it was determined that a concrete chute placed to the right side of the drain could be utilized in meeting the erosion problem. The estimated cost for the project is approximately \$12,000. It was recommended that the Commission participate on the basis of 50% for the Commission and the remaining 50% to be paid for by the Drain Board. Secretary Hoisveen was questioned as to the reason for increasing the amount to 50% rather than the customary 40%. He implied that the Commission had in past instances, in order to encourage erosion control, participated to the extent of 50% on drop structure construction. This was believed to be an excellent practice in order to encourage drainage boards to conserve soil. A motion was made by Commissioner Steinberger and seconded by Commissioner Corwin that the amount expended be limited to \$6,000. Carried

GROUP DRAIN STRUCTURE PARTICIPATION - TRAILL COUNTY WATER CONSERVA-TION AND FLOCD CONTROL DISTRICT A request from the Traill County Water Conservation and Flood Control District for participation on a drop structure located in Section 11, Township 144 North, Range 48 West came up for consideration. The estimated cost of the structure approximates \$3,000. It was

pointed out that the drain in which the structure was located was constructed as a group drain and did not have legal status. The State Water Conservation

Commission in the past had not found it advisable to participate in group drains inasmuch as they were eligible for payment through the Agricultural Stabilization Committee. It was also pointed out in a report by the drainage engineer that the drop inlet which was to be used in connection with the structure was inadequate and did not meet the State Water Conservation Commission's specifications. It was the consensus of the members of the Commission that no participation should be made by the Commission in the structure in view of its status as a group drain. It was the recommendation of the Commission that the Traill County Flood Control District be advised of the Commission's stand on this matter.

Secretary Hoisveen called attention of the

CORPS OF ENGINEERS LAND ACQUISITION POLICIES

Commission to the fact that Mr. Graves of the Corps of Army Engineers Appraisal Board had called in the office regarding the land acquisition policies of the Corps of Engineers in acquiring land for the Oahe Reservoir. Mr. Graves had taken several notes while in the office of the Commission to the effect that he would like to see the State Water Conservation Commission act as a consultant (1) In matters concerning land upon which water rights had been filed (2) He thought the Commission should also offer suggestions regarding comparable sales of land elsewhere and possibly the Corps of Engineers would abide by the suggestions of the Commission; (3) He also thought the Commission might like to discuss the severance problems endured by the displeased owners resulting from disturbances of the economic balance of the farm unit after taking; (4) He averred the participation in any such program by the Commission would not be as a puppet but would receive recognition by the Corps in decisions that the Commission would make. The Commission membership was of the opinion that the State Water Conservation Commission should not act in any capacity in regard to the land appraisals and that a copy of the information obtained from the Corps should be made available to our State Land Department as they may be in a position to care for the matter.

CASS COUNTY DRAIN # 2

Baldwin appeared before the Commission regarding the possible extension of Drain # 2. Commissioner Corwin mentioned the fact that Drain # 2 received approval by the State Water Commission for cost participation in September 1961. It was contended by the gentlemen appearing before the Commission that the drainage board turned over the matter of design to a surveyor in the Soil Conservation Service. It was averred that the drain would be run a distance of 25 miles when it is but a short distance from the Maple River itself. It was further contended that the water moves in a southeasterly direction and causes severe flooding as it cannot cross the Maple ridge. The proposed drain calls for a 14 foot cut and it was contended that the soils of the Red River could not stand such a cut as the banks would fail and slough as a result of it. It was also argued that a great number of bridges would be required over the longer course and thereby increase the cost of the drain to the county. These were the contentions of Mr. Nesemeier. Mr. Andrews stated that much concern has been expressed by landowners over the possible overloading of the lower drain # 2 if the added water is permitted to be dumped into it. He also stated that the drain originally had been improperly engineered as it was built about 1902 when equipment was horse drawn and the horses were unable to work in the wet ground so the drain was moved to a higher elevation which permitted the cut to be performed. It was contended by the Chief Engineer that additional work in the way of surveys would be

required if the State Engineer is to make an opinion on the case. The consensus of the members of the water commission was that no hearing had been held relative to the drain and that we would like to refrain from comment until such a time as the hearing was held.

CASS COUNTY GROUND WATER SURVEY

He stated that Mr. Savageau, Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, had requested him to appear before the State Water Conservation Commission and state the county's case in view of the fact that they were much interested in obtaining such a survey. Mr. Andrews brought to the attention of the Commission the fact that it would be 15 or more years before water would be available through the Garrison Diversion Project. He indicated that industry and other demands in the Cass County area were such that water was becoming of prime importance to the area and it was most desirable that an inventory be established of water availability in Cass County at the earliest possible date. He requested that the chief engineer of the State Water Commission and the district geologist for the Ground Water Branch of the U. S. Geological Survey be present at a meeting of the Board of County Commissioners in Fargo on January 12 to present the Cass County Commissioners the facts relative to a ground water study. He also expressed concern that the State Water Conservation Commission might not have a sufficient amount of equipment available to them to meet the demands for ground water studies. He indicated that the State

Water Conservation Commission should use every possible opportunity available to them to secure funds, even from the emergency fund, in order to make these studies at as rapid a rate as possible. Mr. Hoisveen was directed to meet with

the Cass County Board of Commissioners on January 12.

WEATHER MODIFICATION STUDIES

Commissioner Steinberger reported on weather modification studies which the Commission had agreed to participate in with the Farm Bureau

Mr. Andrews brought up the situation regarding

a countywide ground water study in Cass County.

at its meeting on September 26. Mr. Steinberger had considerable material available to him in the way of a report and also commented upon his personal experiences in a three-county endeavor to increase rain in the north Souris Valley area. He indicated that he would be meeting with the Farm Bureau on January 10 and make his report available to that group in order that they might make recommendations concerning state participation in weather modification work. Commissioner Steinberger also stated that a meeting was scheduled for a weather modification council in South Dakota. Secretary Hoisveen was directed to write to Dr. Hatlo at the School of Mines in Rapid City and obtain the date of the meeting. Commissioner Corwin moved that Henry Steinberger and Einar Dahl be authorized to attend the South Dakota weather modification meeting. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Gallagher and carried.

SENATE BILL 230 Mr. Fredrickson brought to the Commission's attention a resolution concerning an amendment to Senate Bill 230, 87th Congress which deals with the authorization of the Garrison Diversion Unit. The amendment reads as follows:

WHEREAS, the Senate Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs on August 30, 1961 reported favorably with amendments and recommended that Senate Bill 230, 87th Congress, 1st Session, to make certain provisions in connection with the construction of the Garrison Diversion Unit, MissouriRiver Basin Project, by the Secretary of the Interior, do pass (S.Rept. 833); and

WHEREAS, in order to better protect and safeguard the tax bases of the counties affected, the interests of the landowners therein, and the economic stability of the agricultural industry in the areas of the unit where land is proposed to be acquired for the conservation and development of the fish and wildlife resources it appears advisable and necessary to further amend the said Bill;
